Norwegian Bestsellers Snorre Sturluson's <u>Heimskringla</u> (The History of Kings), written in the Old Norse Period (A.D. 750–1300), remains a bestseller in Norway today.

There are more than 60 literature festivals annually in Norway. The most popular is the Norwegian Literature Festival, that takes place in Lillehammer from late May to early June.

The Biblo Tøyen, is Norway's first library only for those ages 10-15. There's a homework area inside a converted tuk-tuk (a three-wheeled taxi), plus other cool reading spaces inside the back of an old Volvo truck, or a gondola hanging from the ceiling. Grown-ups are not allowed.

Norway Takes Roadside Stops to a New Level

Natural wonders are being amplified by art, design and architecture on selected roads in Norway. Several Norwegian architects have transformed average resting areas and parking lots into magnificent, must-visit attractions. The scenic route covers 1,336 miles across western Norway, and has taken two decades to complete.

Ureddplassen, one of the most popular attractions, is a wave-shaped bathroom facility that overlooks the open sea. With a wide terrace and sitting area, this rest stop has become a popular spot for locals and visitors to view the northern lights. It is also a memorial to those who died when the submarine "Uredd" hit a mine in World War II.

The Stegastein viewpoint, Steilneset Memorial and Selvika Bay are only a few among a dozen other off-road attractions that have helped boost tourism in the more remote corners of Norway.

World's First Powerhouse Hotel

The world's first energy-positive hotel will be nestled on the Svartisen glacier, about 1,000 miles north of Oslo. The hotel Svart, meaning "black" in Norwegian, will be built above the arctic circle and will be accessible only by boat. The Arctic's first "powerhouse" is expected to reduce energy consumption by almost 85 percent compared to a regular hotel.

Svart will be built in a circular form due to the study of how mapping of solar radiation behaves. The hotel's energy will be produced by solar panels that will be strategically placed to retain the sun's energy.

With expectations to preserve the pristine Northern Norwegian nature, architectural firm Snøhetta has designed the hotel to be built primarily out of environmental materials like wood and stone.

Expected to open in 2021, the hotel will rest on the bottom of the pristine Arctic waters, offering visitors panoramic views of the fjord and glacier. To learn more about Svart, visit https://snohetta.com/projects/366-svart.

MID SUMMER FEST

The Norwegians celebrate Midsummer Eve on June 23 or the Saturday closest to the date. The summer fest originated in the ancient Norse society long before Christianity was introduced and been observed ever since.

The Old Norse honored the sun with pagan ceremonies at summer solstice. The turning of the sun was believed to be a perilous event. If the sun failed to take the right course, mankind was doomed to perish. At this critical time, the world of the living was open to the beings of the nether world. Trolls, ghosts and other creatures roamed the earth.

When Christianity was introduced, the ancient sun festival was replaced by the celebration of the birthday of John the Baptist. The Church realized that a mere ban on the pagan fest would not dispel the deep-rooted folk beliefs connected with this day. So while the celebrations were given a new purpose, the customs and superstition surrounding Midsummer Eve existed hand in hand with the Christian tradition.

Fire has always played a significant role in the midsummer celebrations. The old Norse kept blazing bonfires going to give renewed power to the sun. The bonfires were also believed to drive away the supernatural beings which threatened both man and beast at this time.

In our time the bonfires still flame all over Norway on Midsummer Eve, but the celebration has taken on a new meaning. Now Midsummer or St. Hans as it is called, is a celebration of the blonde, Norwegian summer, the short, light summer nights and nature in general. Along the coast, bonfires blaze on every islet and skerry. Boats filled with high-spirited and cheerful people gather together and form long processions which parade along the coast to the accompaniment of accordion music. There are evening picnics served in every little cove and on every rock shelf along the shoreline. In some places, people meet for a community celebration, build a huge communal bonfire and have grand festivities with good and dancing.
